This week is NAIDOC week (7 - 14 July), a time when we celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. This year's theme was 'Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud & Proud'. Fire is a symbol of connection to Country, to each other, and to the rich tapestry of traditions that define Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The theme highlights the enduring strength and vitality of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture.

This year's NAIDOC week poster, entitled 'Urapun Muy' was created by artist Deb Belyea, a proud Samuawgadhalgal woman from the Torres Strait.

"In this work, I have depicted the hands of our ancestors that have carefully dropped a burning ember on to a fire. This ember burns hot with intensity, stoking the flames, as it combines with the new fire. The linear detail shows the energy and power as cultural knowledge is transferred from our ancestors to us today. Culture is the fire that gives us knowledge, wisdom and purpose."

We are very lucky at STARS to have our own art collection which features a large representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander works. Please take a moment when travelling around the hospital to appreciate some of these artworks and their expressions of cultural knowledge.

As part of Accreditation preparation STARS underwent a Peer Review led by Metro North Director of Nursing Clinical Governance Shirley Thompson on Wednesday and Thursday. As part of this process, 16 peer assessors visited areas throughout the hospital and the Oral Health Centre.

The assessors had many positive comments about the work that we do here at STARS and thanked staff for being so welcoming and engaging during the two-day review. In addition, SERA researcher Peter Window received a grant to continue his work involving cognitive-behavioural therapy-informed virtual reality for persistent back pain.
