"Teaching others has always been my favourite part of my nursing work, I get so much satisfaction from helping others to gain knowledge and apply it in practice.

"My work in the ICU as part of the MET team and in the ICU outreach service allowed me to work closely with the ward staff, supporting them to manage the acute deterioration of their patients and I observed their anxiety in challenging situations. I am so grateful for the opportunity I have now to share the knowledge and skills I have gained in critical care in the CNCF role.

"My advice to nurses at any stage in their career is to find a work area that excites and challenges you. We are so lucky as nurses to have transferrable skills and the ability to try different specialties.
