Staff profile: Neonatal clinical nurse Lyn Chapple

Yesterday (August 15) was International Neonatal Nurses Day, so what better time to acknowledge one of our most experienced neonatal nurses, Lyn Chapple, who has been with the Royal NICU for 30 years.

As you can imagine, Lyn has seen a host of changes in that time.

"Just the technology we use has improved out of sight," she says.

"We are able to care for much younger and smaller babies nowadays."

Lyn, who is also involved with Neonatal Research and works in the NeoRESQ program, says the way parents are incorporated into the babies' care is another area that has evolved immensely.

"With things like our newborn reading program and kangaroo care (skin-to-skin), we place much more of an emphasis on parental involvement, which is great for both babies and parents."

Lyn says her favourite part of the job is seeing the impact the care delivered at the Royal can have on families.

"We are there to support and care for not just the babies, but the whole family unit. And you can see what a difference you can make to those families who are often going through a distressing and confusing time.



"There's nothing better than when a family comes back with their toddler or small child to say thank-you to the team – you can literally see the impact you've had on people's lives."
