Multi-agency Training Simulation, first of its kind



This week, RBWH hosted a Multi-agency Trauma Training Simulation exercise in collaboration with QAS and the QPS Special Emergency Response Team (SERT), that was a first of its kind for Queensland and a first for the hospital. The scenario was focused on the reception and initial management of a critically injured SERT officer.

RBWH was the test site to work through the pathway. The simulation was coordinated by our TACT Team in collaboration with ETC, Trauma Service, Surgery, Medical Imaging, Blood Bank, Anaesthetics and Perioperative Services along with QPS, QAS and Metro North Health Disaster Response.

A real-life SERT officer was used as the "patient" with two gunshot wounds, brought into the ETC by her colleagues, to ensure the scenario was as realistic as possible. The simulation ran successfully but the real value was in the learning conversations that took place afterwards in the

debrief.

Director of Trauma Service, Dr. Carl Lisec said it was a test of a new process whereby trained police medics provided immediate, life-saving treatment at the scene and then transport the patient directly to hospital themselves, without the direct assistance of the Queensland Ambulance Service.

This saves valuable time for the patient and ensures they reach the operating room for definitive care as quickly and as safely as possible.

It cannot be overstated how valuable such simulations are in building efficient processes – and additionally, the SERT officers involved will now be far more familiar with the hospital and its operational procedures.
