2024 Redcliffe Hospital Research Symposium

On Thursday, more than 120 people joined the annual Redcliffe Hospital Research Symposium. The event brought together 17 presentations, ranging from how to improve sleep quality among ICU patients to optimising preoperative processes through use of patient surveys and a clinical assistant screener. All the research presentations have led or will lead to changes in clinical practice to improve the patient experience at Redcliffe Hospital.

A number of awards were presented at the event, including:

Research Excellence Award—Maree Duroux, Megan Ratcliffe and Samantha Shone (Redcliffe Hospital Research Hub) in recognition of their outstanding efforts in coordinating and conducting clinical trials at Redcliffe Hospital, dating back 32 years and for their recent leadership of

PowerTrials implementation (Megan), the National Clinical Trials Governance Framework implementation (Maree) and a focus on compassionate clinical trial participant care for vulnerable patients (Samantha).

Inaugural Researcher of the Year Award—Dr. Joel Dulhunty (Director of Research)
Joel has been a dedicated supporter of research for many years and is a strong supporter of researchers in their fields of study. He recently achieved a significant milestone by publishing the BLING III trial, a randomized controlled trial on antibiotic administration in ICU and a related systematic review and meta-analysis in JAMA. Involving more than 7000 patients from 104 ICUs in 7 countries, the results were practice-changing and demonstrated that continuous infusions were associated with improved mortality at day 90 and better clinical care at day 14. Joel's dedication and leadership were instrumental in this remarkable research outcome.
