On Tuesday Metro North transitioned to Tier 0 in our Acute Respiratory Illness Response Plan due to a decline in both attendance and admissions for acute respiratory illnesses. # Caretaker period

Just a reminder that from 1 October we will be in caretaker period. While this period is business as usual there are certain conventions that we need to abide by including:

- No significant appointments
- No making or implementing major policy decisions that are likely to commit an incoming government, and
- No major contracts or undertakings.

Caretaker mode will remain in effect until the election result is clear, or in the event of a change of government, until the new government is sworn in.
