STARS Public Cataract/Intraocular Lens Surgery Service

Metro North patients are set to benefit from a 12-month trial of a new referral process for cataract surgery. STARS Deputy Director of Ophthalmology Dr Mark Loane and Orthoptics and Optometry Team Leader Paula Freijah found the current referral process of only using a vision test to determine eligibility for cataract surgery led to many patients not qualifying. After extensive consultations, the team have introduced an Visual Disability Assessment (VDA) questionnaire, which will increase patients' eligibility.
