Unacceptable Behaviour – Discharge from Care Procedure

Occupational Violence (OV) is one of the leading work-related incidents reported by Metro North staff. Nobody should accept OV as 'part of the job'.

Metro North has an *Unacceptable Behaviour – Discharge from Care Procedure* that provides a structured framework for staff to work with senior clinicians to discharge a patient from care when there is an immediate risk of harm to themselves or others. The procedure includes a rapid assessment, employing de-escalation strategies and a critical risk assessment before a patient is discharged.

I encourage everyone to find out more and <u>watch the new video</u> to familiarise themselves with the procedure.

Planned non-essential power shutdown

As part of planned electrical works, there will need to be another planned non-essential power shutdown in early December. It won't be as extensive as the last one but will involve services in Building 01 and Building 15.

These works will enable power to be connected to Building 50, the new office accommodation for staff decanting from Building 14.

We have yet to confirm the exact date for the planned shutdown, but we'll make sure everyone has plenty of notice. Like last time, it will likely be early morning on the weekend to minimise disruption.

When the planned power shutdown occurs, parts of buildings 01 and 15 will lose non-essential power (white power points) for approximately two hours.

More details about what's planned and how everyone impacted can help prepare will be coming soon.

Ministerial priorities

Queensland's new Health Minister, Hon. Tim Nicholls, has started visiting Metro North Health facilities, and we look forward to welcoming him at TPCH soon.

In last week's message, you will have read about the consultation currently underway to support a new name for Queensland's satellite hospitals. The commitment to consulting clinicians on a new name for these facilities is a part of the Queensland Government's 100-day plan, and all hospital staff are invited to have their say using the <u>online survey</u>.

Renaming satellite hospitals is one of the new government's priorities in the health portfolio. Others include:

- Real-time reporting of health data
- Reducing ambulance ramping
- Stabilising the elective surgery waitlist
- New models of care between Emergency Departments and Mental Health Units
- Expanded access to transit lounges to free up acute bed capacity
- Improvements in outcomes and access for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

There's a lot more detail about these and other priorities set out in the Minister's Charter Letter, which I encourage everyone to read. As part of Queensland's public health system, we'll be playing an important role in supporting these priorities for the benefit of all Queenslanders.
