#### Planned power shutdown tomorrow morning

The TPCH Expansion Project team will be undertaking a planned shutdown of non-essential power tomorrow, Saturday, 7 December, from 4:30am to 6:30am. This is to enable the connection of power to Building 50, the new modular accommodation for staff decanting from Building 14.

The power outage activity requires a temporary two-hour shutdown of non-essential power (white power points) in parts of Building 1 (B01), the Main Acute Hospital and Building 15 (B15), the Cardiac Investigations Care Wing. Essential power (red and blue power points) will not be affected, and no other building on the campus is expected to be impacted.

I ask that everyone impacted read all email communication about the planned non-essential power shutdown and ensure business continuity arrangements are in place for the works to commence at 4.30am Saturday, 7 December.

#### Patient and consumer feedback

In my message last week, I talked about how important it is to listen to our patients, to understand what is important to them.

This week, I saw some great consumer feedback from a patient in the adult emergency department. The patient, who has some other conditions, talked about her experiences with the doctor who treated her.

[She] was incredibly kind and attentive ... She made several offers to assist with my comfort, such as finding a quiet room for me to wait in while waiting to be discharged.

She actively listened and worked collaboratively with me as a patient, empowering me as someone with chronic illnesses.

Finally, she found resources to provide me with along with my discharge paperwork.

[She] went above and beyond, and was such a lovely, welcome doctor to meet after a very stressful day.

Thank you to everyone in the Emergency Department who cared for this patient, and to the medical officer in particular. Feedback like this speaks to the impact we can each have in our patient's lives, and how they experience our care.

#### ANZCCT Conference

Last week, TPCH was proud to host the 3rd Australia and New Zealand Complex Coronary Therapeutics meeting (ANZ CCT).

The meeting brought together more than 90 delegates from across Australia and New Zealand, with a packed program that included eight complex coronary interventional cases broadcast live to our Education Centre, together with lectures and presentations of complex PCI cases presented over the two days.

Among the positive feedback received from participants was the suggestion that TPCH hosted one of the best meetings on complex intervention delegates have ever attended.

We're grateful to the TPCH Cardiac Investigations Unit for helping arrange the meeting and to convenors Professor Darren Walters and Dr Rustem Dautov and course Directors Dr Sidney Lo from NSW and Professor Scott Harding from New Zealand.
