This week has certainly come with its own set of challenges, but as always, I am so impressed at how we have all come together to tackle what was thrown our way. As our weather temperatures and humidity rose this week, so did our demand for care through the emergency department and within our inpatient teams.

This was, however, made only more challenging when we had air-conditioning issues in the Clinical Services Building on Wednesday night, seeing us step into a Code Yellow. The air-conditioning issues were resolved by Thursday morning. The Code Yellow did result in the need to reschedule surgeries and procedures to ensure patient safety, while we checked all our sterile stock to ensure its integrity had not been breached and did environmental checks to ensure any further risks were managed.

As we step down from the Code Yellow this morning, we have identified the issue and are in the process of putting a second fail-safe fix in place to prevent any future air-conditioning failures, with the BEMs team onsite monitoring the air-conditioning system at all times.

I want to thank all the staff who were working at the time of this event and subsequently for their professionalism, as we have moved through this situation. Members of the Incident Management Team commented on how as a site we all leant in and how solutions focused we were as a team. For this I am sincerely proud and thankful to you all.

Meanwhile, patients continued to present, the weather continued to be challenging and cause heat related illness or exacerbation of illness, while we were also having to advise patients about delays. Through it all, it's obvious that the team at CKW leant in to support our community and each other. Thank you.

We continue to see high demand through emergency, with high numbers of very complex and unwell patients presenting via Queensland Ambulance Service and a lot of staff illness as well. I want to thank the entire team, as each and every one of you contribute to patient care for our community and your commitment during these challenging times, is so evident.

Audiology visit



On Wednesday, it was a true privilege to visit Kelly and our Audiology team. Wow!

This team works out of the Allied Health Outpatients department. They see patients aged 0 to 16 years of age and on average receive around 1,550 referrals per year, but this is growing. They service not only the CKW region, but from Chermside to the boarder of the Sunshine Coast as they are part of a Statewide service provided at CHQ, SCUH and Caboolture for SEQ.

As most of you know, hearing or the identification of hearing deficits, are essential to development in those first 2,000 days (a reminder that we are celebrating and focusing on the year of the Child, Adolescent and Young Adult here at Metro North).

The team do an amazing job in a very small environment with two retrofitted hearing booths which are really interesting to look at. While we have two small rooms, we undertake three different tests in the rooms that all have different equipment requirements. While the team manage with the existing small space and do a great job, the rooms are not ideal.

It is exciting that we are in the planning to expand the service space to meet this demand in the new Paediatric Specialist Outpatient Department. What an amazing team and service.

- 40 kids Christmas Gifts with support of Harvey Norman Aspley and Rotary.
- 80 Toiletry kits for mental health patients.

Additional to this, Steve has advised that The Common Good will fund in 2025:

- Therapy Dogs: Two therapy dogs doing fortnightly visits to Caboolture for a 12-month period.
- 2 Replica Ovalia Egg Chairs: The chairs help neurodiverse children manage anxieties and stress they may experience in a hospital setting. The Chairs will be used in our paediatric services.
- SmileyScope for Paediatric ED: This is a virtual reality headset that children can wear as a means of distraction when feeling overwhelmed when a medical procedure is taking place.
- Child Life Therapist (CLT): This role helps works with children to minimise the stress, fear and anxiety hospitalised children might experience and improve their coping strategies, which not only benefit young patients and their families, but also their treating teams. This role will work across paediatric services.

Alongside this, the team continue to provide significant support to our research here at CKW which I will showcase in future emails. Many thanks to Steve and The Common Good team for their ongoing support.


