Queensland Cancer Centre update

You may be aware that the Queensland Government has announced that a review of the Capacity Expansion Program (CEP) is underway. The Queensland Cancer Centre (QCC) is one of the three Metro North CEP projects currently involved in this review.

We will provide a full update once the CEP review is complete.

In the meantime, the Metro North QCC project user and advisory groups continue, as do important planning activities such as developing Detailed Models of Care/ Service Delivery and consulting with the Hospital and Alcohol Drug Service (HADS) team regarding future relocation.

Thank you to all the teams as we continue with these activities. The insights gained help ensure we deliver the best healthcare infrastructure and services possible.

Volunteers now managed by RBWH

HBCIS update for gender and pronouns

From February 2025, HBCIS will be updated to enable the recording of a patient's sex assigned at birth (Birth Sex) as well as gender and pronouns. This represents an important first step for Queensland Health in acknowledging and recording health consumer's gender identity within the Patient Admission System (PAS).

After my baby was born via C-section, I spent two days in the hospital, and the postnatal care was exceptional. The midwives were incredibly supportive with breastfeeding, recovery, and helping me learn how to care for my baby. They checked in on me regularly, offering constant guidance and reassurance, which made those early days so much easier.

The care didn't stop when I left the hospital. The after-birth care program has been nothing short of extraordinary. One nurse in particular has been a true lifeline. Her many home visits, continuous breastfeeding support, and encouragement have been invaluable. I genuinely cannot imagine how I would have gotten through these weeks without her.

To the entire team at RBWH, thank you from the bottom of my heart. Your dedication and care made such a difference to me and my family, and I cannot recommend you highly enough!
