# Staff profile - Meenu Wadhwa

Meenu is a Child Life Therapist in TPCH's Children's Emergency Department. She implements play-based, developmentally appropriate interventions to support the emotional safety and psychological well-being of young patients. This helps minimise their fear and anxiety in order to improve their ability to cope with procedures and the unknown of the clinical environment.

"As a child life therapist, my job is to support the emotional well-being of children and their families while they are in hospital receiving medical care," said Meenu.

"I'm there to ensure when we fix their broken bones or treat their illnesses, we aren't leaving them with emotional scars or trauma that will follow them long after they leave hospital."



Meenu has paved the way as a child life therapist at TPCH, being the first in a Queensland public hospital.

She is passionate about people finding their courage to dream and not being confined by the expectation of others.

# Fast Facts - Podiatry team

## Did you know?

- TPCH Podiatry is a small clinical team of 4.9 full-time equivalent staff, supported by other roles including Director Podiatry Metro North, Statewide Podiatry Clinical Educator, and conjoint Research Fellow.
- Podiatry's core business is a hospital-wide foot disease and high-risk foot service, Monday and Friday. It also delivers a part-time musculoskeletal/biomechanical service to support orthopaedic wait list management.
- The service has weekly joint clinics with Infectious Diseases and Orthopaedics which enables timely interdisciplinary care to reduce the risk of hospitalisation and improve patient outcomes.
- Diabetes related foot disease is a leading cause of hospitalisation and disability burdens, but staff all have a role to play in early recognition, early response and timely referral. Undertake a short (20 minute) training 'Recognise, response and refer to Foot Disease: <u>Foot Disease: Recognise,</u> <u>Respond, Refer (FDRRR) - Courses - Central (csds.qld.edu.au)</u>
