The NeoRESQ service turned 10 years old earlier this week. This designated Statewide neonatal retrieval service cares for preterm and critically unwell infants around the state who require care in a higher level neonatal intensive care nursery. Over the past ten years, the team have transported **7,500** premature and unwell newborns around Queensland and northern NSW. What an achievement for this small but mighty service!

New Cancer Care Service on Bribie Island



The new RBWH Centre Cancer Care Service at Bribie Island Satellite Health Centre welcomed its first patients earlier this month, marking a major step forward in advancing cancer healthcare in the region. The new sixchair specialist outpatient service provides low-risk chemotherapy, blood product support and therapy treatments for patients residing in the Bribie Island region and has the capacity to treat up to 70 patients per week. The EMPOWER Project – the first Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games Legacy Project

Jamieson Trauma Institute (JTI), RBWH, Metro North Health, in partnership with Queenslanders with Disability Network (QDN) have been awarded \$1 million funding by the Queensland Government for the EMPOWER project. EMPOWER will enhance the understanding and collection of data about the participation of Queenslanders with disability in sport and recreation and improve inclusion and accessibility across the State.

EMPOWER through JTI, QDN and its wider collaborative network aims to produce evidence-based outcomes such as a long-term data collection framework for more inclusive and accessible sports and recreation participation for Queenslanders with disability. The project aims to develop a strong foundation for vibrant, inclusive communities and significantly improve overall community wellbeing for all Queenslanders with disabilities towards 2032 and beyond.

After P.A.R.T.Y booster video and proposed study

Last week, I learnt about the *After P.A.R.T.Y.* booster video, a follow up initiative to the statewide P.A.R.T.Y. Program (Prevent Alcohol and Risk-related Trauma in Youth). The P.A.R.T.Y Program is an injury prevention initiative that reaches around 4,500 Queensland high school students aged 15-18 each year. In her research, RBWH Professor Cate Cameron found that while the P.A.R.T.Y program improves students' attitudes towards risk taking behaviour, there was a decline in retention of key safety messages over time. This highlighted the need for ongoing reinforcement, leading to the creation of the *After P.A.R.T.Y* booster video.

The video focuses on the 'Fatal Five' risky driving behaviours: speeding, driving under the influence, distracted driving, failing to wear a seatbelt, and driver fatigue. It aims to reduce road trauma and can be shown in schools to students who have completed the P.A.R.T.Y. Program, with no geographical limitations.
