Redcliffe Hospital will be implementing the Smartpage digital solution in June for a six-month proof of concept trial. During the trial, the Smartpage system will manage operational tasks requested through Patient Support Services.

Smartpage will streamline the allocation of patient support resources and support the management of operational tasks like patient movement and environmental cleaning. With

Smartpage, staff will be able to see the status of operational task requests, and Patient Support Officers will receive and manage tasks using mobile devices, improving the information they have available while on the move.

Staff Profile: Lachlan Meares

This week's Staff Profile features Security Officer, Lachlan Meares. A born and bred Peninsula local, Lachlan's role combines a job with daily challenges with a workplace close to home.

"I've been a Security Officer at Redcliffe Hospital for six and a half years now," Lachlan said.

"It's fair to say that no two days are the same and I really enjoy the variety the job brings."

Lachlan is part of a team of security officers, who work 24/7. As part of his job, Lachlan works to de-escalate situations and to keep staff and patients safe while they are in our care.

He cites helping people who may be in crisis situations as the most rewarding part of the job.

"People are in hospital for many different reasons," Lachlan said.

"We often deal with people who are highly stressed or agitated, it's very rewarding when you manage to engage with these people to deescalate a situation and help them understand that hospital staff are there to help them."

When he's not at work, Lachlan is a regular gym goer and is keen to share nutrition and training knowledge with others.

"I used to be a keen rugby league player, but had to give that up due to injuries," Lachlan said.



"Now, I train regularly at the gym and do a little personal training to help others reach their training goals."

Thanks to Lachlan and all our security team for the important role they plan in looking after our hospital community.
