Shout out

A big shout to the excellent teamwork displayed by QAS, our Emergency Department (ED), Intensive Care Unit and Cardiology teams earlier this week while responding to a complex cardiac case.

The patient had an out of hospital cardiac arrest with VF/VT (ventricular tachycardia/ventricular fibrillation) with inferior STEMI (ST-segment elevation myocardial infarction). QAS contacted ED and cath lab was activated prehospital. The teams worked together to deliver urgent and coordinated care. The patient was in the cath lab within 27 minutes from arrival for a successful RCA (Right Coronary Artery) stent.

Through clear communication, quick decision-making and the collaborative approach between departments, the patient received timely treatment and is now recovering well.

Thanks to Dr Melanie Rule for providing this example of all staff who played a role – this is yet another strong example of teamwork and excellence in care we see across TPCH every day.
