

The new Health Equity Strategy sets out four clear priorities to guide us:

- Zero tolerance for racism in Metro North Health.
- Culturally safe and welcoming care across all hospital and healthcare services.



Co-designed models of care that reflect and respect culture. Data-driven action to sustain long-term, culturally safe equity.

Stop Racism. It Starts with Me.

At the same forum, Metro North Health launched its new anti-racism campaign *Stop Racism. It Starts with Me* in the lead up to NAIDOC Week celebrations, 6 to 13 July 2025.

The campaign invites all of us to address unconscious bias and institutionalised racism in healthcare for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

The campaign was co-designed with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff, patients, and community members, as part of truth-telling and focusing on what racism looks like, sounds like, and feels like.

The campaign is supported by a newly developed <u>Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander anti-</u><u>racism policy</u> and reporting mechanism for incidents of racism. It is designed to create educational awareness among Metro North's workforce and empower you collectively to see racism, change it and stop it.

The initial focus of the campaign is supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, with future phases supporting the culturally and linguistically diverse community and other racially affected communities working in and accessing Metro North Health.

This is an important initiative to affect real change in our health system and I am calling on each and every one of you to get on board and put a stop to racism. A series of films, posters and educational resources have been created and can be accessed <u>here</u>.

Most of all, please be kind to each other as we continue to see high demand, support your colleagues and continue to respond to the community's needs.


