Kia Ora CKW team,

Though we were challenged with demand from our community, it has been a fantastic week for the CKW Clinical Directorate, with Yarun (Bribie Island) Satellite Health Centre having a visit from the Member for Pumicestone on Monday, successfully achieving accreditation on Tuesday with no recommendations on Tuesday and celebrating Yarun's first birthday on Wednesday.

Congratulations to the Yarun team and all those who supported the accreditation achievement. It is a stressful process, and I know the team put a lot of energy and positive action into it. The accreditors commented on the friendliness and collaborative approach across the site and within the community.

It was great to see and engage with our community members who attended all of these events. Since opening in 2024, the Bribie Island Satellite Health Centre has provided more than 22,067 episodes of care, reducing the need for Bribie Island residents to travel offisland for care and improving access to timely care.

The services provided at Yarun include a Minor Injury and Illness Clinic, Day Medical Treatment Unit, Cancer Care, Kidney Health and Outpatient Mental Health Services, plus the Healthy Ageing Assessment and Rehabilitation Team (HAART), Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Hub and medical imaging.


Congratulations to the entire team for such a successful year and accreditation process and thank you to everyone who attended the small celebration on Thursday.

In amongst this, Caboolture Hospital, CKW Clinical Directorate and all of Metro North have been under significant pressure, with high demand for inpatient beds putting all facilities on a Tier 3 for most of the week. Obviously, this has put a lot of pressure on everyone in order to manage the increase in demand. I want to acknowledge and thank all the incredible resilience and teamwork demonstrated by staff during this challenging period.

One of the things we do need to do, is make sure that at all times we are moving people through our services efficiently. We cannot "hold" patients in the acute beds for last treatments, meals, or for social reasons. Please, can I ask that you make every attempt to move our patients to the transit lounge as early as possible when discharge is impending. If there are social issues or other delays to discharge, please ensure you escalate to your manager, the Hospital Coordinator or your Nursing Director so that we can assist.

Ariana Doolan MP and Cancer Council Executives visit BISHC

On Monday 14 July, local state member for Pumicestone Ariana Doolan and various Cancer Council Executives, joined Dr Melissa Eastgate Executive Director of Metro North Health Cancer Care Services, Dr Ted Chamberlain and myself, for a tour of the BISHC facility. The main goal of the tour was to see the new RBWH Centre Cancer Care Service, which came online in March this year.

The new six-chair specialist outpatient service provides low risk chemotherapy, blood product support and therapy treatments for patients residing in the Bribie Island region and has the capacity to treat up to 70 patients every week.

Ms Doolan was keen to see the whole site and chat to staff and patients. It was great to see and hear the positive feedback provided by staff and patients about the services. The patients particularly talked about the significant improvement to their life and their support people from having a facility closer to home.



Race to Uluru

Our brilliant Eat Walk Engage team are once again encouraging movement in a fun and interactive way. This time, patients on various wards are encouraged to collectively walk the distance between Caboolture to Uluru, which is a total of 3,450 kms. The friendly competition kicked off on Monday where patients were challenged to walk laps around their ward, recording the laps or half-laps they complete on a shared ward tally board.

There are six wards participating this year - 2A, 3A, 3B, 3C, 4C and 4D. So far, the patient feedback has been wonderful with Simone on ward 4D (pictured below) saying: "I haven't been up walking much since I've been in hospital. It's really nice to be up and doing something."

I was so disappointed in not being able to cut the ribbon, but am really looking forward to seeing progress and cheering on the wards at the end of the race.





Child Life Therapist - Lucy

I am so ecstatic to welcome Lucy to our muchanticipated inaugural Child Life Therapist role at Caboolture Hospital!

Thanks to The Common Good for funding the first two years of this role, to enable us to formalise it as a permanent part of our team.

As a child life therapist, Lucy's role is to support children's emotional wellbeing and coping during procedures they receive during their hospital stay. Lucy uses medical play to demonstrate to children what's going to happen and also uses positive distraction techniques while they are getting procedures such as a cannula.



Lucy's passion for the role comes from previous work experience as a paediatric occupational therapist where she worked with neurodiverse children. Lucy will divide her time between the Paediatric ward and paediatric Emergency Department at Caboolture Hospital, ensuring that children who need her most are offered comfort. 
New appointments and recruitment
