ieMR first anniversary at Redcliffe

With all of our celebrations for the 60th Anniversary, it would be easy to overlook another important milestone. It's now been a year since Redcliffe Hospital went digital, going live with ieMR in June and July last year. The Pharmacy team (left) were among those to celebrate the anniversary.

The change from paper to digital should be remembered as a significant milestone in our hospital's history and our successful rollout of ieMR was a great example of what we can achieve when we embrace change and work together.

Acute Respiratory Illness Response

Redcliffe Hospital and Metro North Health have now moved to Tier 1 of the Acute Respiratory Illness Response Plan.

For Redcliffe, the main change is that staff are now required to wear masks when caring for suspected or confirmed acute respiratory illness cases, following PPE guidelines.

We continue to encourage staff to wear surgical masks at other times, if they choose to do so. Masks are encouraged, but not required, for visitors, and are available at all building entrances (pictured right).

As always, if you are unwell, do not come to work - and if your fit testing is overdue, please take action to update it as soon as possible.


Congratulations to everyone involved, and we wish both teams the best of luck for the awards next month.
