Some important activities - Aged Care and Disability Forums

There was some very important forums held recently to connect and shape the way we look at aged care and disability care.

The Interagency Forum on Improving Aged Care Pathways saw a range of stakeholders come together from Metro North Health, the Commonwealth Government, Brisbane North PHN, Residential Aged Care providers, Home Care Package providers, and aged care and advocacy organisations.



The forum examined delays in the discharge of older people from hospital, identified both systemic and operational barriers, and collaboratively developed solutions to improve patient flow and access to appropriate care pathways for older people.

COH also celebrated Disability Pride Month by hosting the **Brisbane North Connecting Disability Health Forum – Julian's Key Health Passport**.

Metro North staff and disability service providers were invited along to hear about Julian's Key Health Passport and how it can benefit their consumers and improve communication, health and well-being.

We had plenty of information stalls at the event which provided a great opportunity to network and connect with different healthcare professionals and disability services providers.



Final shout out - Community Transition Care Team

Another great compliment which was sent to the Health Minister and passed onto Metro North.

"I'm an 85-year-old retired banker who has recently experienced a range of services provided by Queensland Health and COH.

"I suffered, what was later diagnosed as an acute left-brain stroke. I summoned the ambulance to my home and was attended to by two very professional young women who transported me to The Prince Charles Hospital (TPCH). I regard my experience with TPCH as something extraordinary.

"It was arranged on discharge for me to pass into the care of the Community Transition Care Program team at Brighton who supported me in-home for some eight weeks while I coped with the mental and physical demands of living by myself in my post-stroke condition.

"From case manager Kira Perry and clinical nurse Laura Coombe to the nurses, physios and social workers who have looked out for me in these past few weeks, the care has been exemplary.

"I think you will read from all of this that I am stunned with the extraordinary care I have been provided by people who do so with such supportive good humour and encouragement every day."


