CKW Research Symposium

Also this week, I had the pleasure of attending the CKW Research Symposium, and wow, I just love research. Every time I attend, I learn what we "do, do" and "don't do." Working in a clinical directorate with a growing community and increasing demand for care, a directorate with the largest Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island population across Metro North, the focus for CKW is on safe and quality patient care, community trust and being a great place to work. Listening to everyone's presentations on Wednesday certainly proved that we are on the right track and we are so lucky to have so many researchers to help better these focus areas. We will showcase some of the research presentations in future messages.

We were also privileged to hear Professor James Ward talk about his work of the Poche Centre for Indigenous Health. Professor Ward is an infectious diseases epidemiologist and a national leader in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander research. He is an inspiration to listen to, and we are lucky to be partnering with Professor Ward on an antiracism project at CKW focused on our emergency department and maternity services. Professor Ward challenged us to expand our research – Queensland is underrepresented in MRFF funded research, and to meaningfully include Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people in the research – let's accept and step up to that challenge.

The unit expands capacity to 15 cot spaces, including three isolation rooms and features modern design improvements such as switchable privacy glass, new medical equipment and dedicated family facilities including two carers' rooms with ensuites, a dining space and a welcoming reception area. This state-of-the-art space not only enhances clinical care but also prioritises the wellbeing and comfort of families and staff.

The health check yarn clinic took place on Friday 29 August. The purpose of the clinic was to engage with community members and Elders, with health care checks provided by the Senior Health worker and Nurse Navigator and health education delivered by ATODs and a Dietitian. The clinic also helped community members become more familiar when attending the Caboolture Satellite Health Centre and promoted access to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Services Team.

Feedback from the day was very positive, with community members saying they "feel like they know themselves better," asking "can we do this every Friday," and sharing that they "enjoyed the sessions and can take some advice from the dietitian to improve their diet."
