I will keep you updated as this work progresses.

On the broader subject of campus safety, Peter King, Director of Facility and Support Services and Sgt Jacob Cranston, Officer in Charge of the RBWH Police Beat, joined the session to provide an update on safety measures. These include additional QPS patrols of areas where staff travel to their vehicles after hours, and recruitment for a night concierge to be located in the atrium near the main entrance to better manage who accesses the hospital overnight.

"Early on, people were less likely to admit when they weren't doing well. Today, more colleagues speak openly after a tough day. It's not always easy, but the more we normalise those conversations, the stronger our culture becomes."

Away from the hospital, Anthony finds balance in the simple things – spending time in his garden and with his cavoodle, Olive.
