Today on National Apology Day, we commemorate the 18th anniversary of the formal apology by former Prime Minister Kevin Rudd to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, particularly the Stolen Generations. The apology acknowledged the intergenerational trauma caused by the forced child removal policies and renewed commitments to reconciliation and healing.



Thank you to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Team for putting on an event at Caboolture Hospital this morning. It gave staff a moment to reflect on the significance of the National Apology, and how each of us can contribute through our roles and interactions to respect, healing, reconciliation and better health outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander patients.
