#### Vale Beth Dawson







It is with profound sadness we report the passing of one of our remarkable members. Beth was born in 1930. She attended Brisbane Girls Grammar School and trained at the Brisbane General Hospital graduating in 1957. Beth went on to do her Midwifery and Child Health training. Although Beth never married or had children of her own, her love of children was obvious to those of us privileged to have worked with her. After doing post-graduate studies, Beth worked with Professor Rendle Short -another lover of children- in the Professorial ward – Fraser, which opened at the Children's Hospital in 1963. Beth passion for paediatrics led her to start a Paediatric Course for Nurses which ran from 1974-1993. Beth retired aged 63.

Beth also had a deep respect for St Johns Ambulance, reaching the rank of Major General. Beth received an AM in 2000 in recognition of her years of service. RIP Beth. We will all miss you immensely.

My memories of Beth, when I went to the RCH (1969) it seemed like almost a third world hospital, the old McConnel
ward, which you can identify with, yet the Professorial unit was so new and clean. Beth was a Senior Sister at that time,
I recall she gave a lecture on how to make babies feeds, although the hospital had a milk kitchen, Beth always ensured
all nurses were competent. The hospital routine at the time was for 2 Registered Nurses to come on duty at 6am, to take
over from the night staff. At 8am the remaining day shift Nurses came on duty, in turn we had to hand over to them.

Beth oozed with knowledge as you handed over patients, guess my knowledge was limited at that time. When she became nurse educator, Beth did the annual credentialling of Resuscitation and Medication Assessment. I think her favourite education topic globally was how to set up a croupette. The key points being to analyse the oxygen at regular intervals and keep the ice supply up to the back of the croupette. Not to mention careful observation of the child's respiratory effort: my how things have changed.

While not in use the croupette sat on the back of a cot. We had a Camphor Laurel tree outside the ward, where we put the children in their cots. One day at a Matron's meeting, it was stated that one ward had leaves in the back of the croupette, that was us for which I said "yes, it's McConnel and they are Camphor Laurel leaves and camphor for the chest!"

I spoke with Beth last September, one story she told me of her experiences of living in the nurses' home, but she was fearful that there may be retribution for having a doona in the nurses' home or it may get stolen. So, at the end of a shift at RBH, they would gather all the patient's newspaper from the previous day, then take them to the nurses' home to put on their beds to keep them warm.
