LIVING IN THE LADY LAMINGTON NURSES' HOME

hese four rooms were built in 1896 as bedrooms for junior or trainee nurses. The colours on the walls in these rooms reflect the original Victorian-era colours. Furniture was provided and the nurses could decorate minimally if they wanted to.

"The accommodation was very basic but clean. There was a bed, and beautiful silky oak bedside table, desk, dresser and wardrobe. Later there was built-in furniture. We were minimalistic bedspread, photos, things like that, but you could never take much."

In the days before fans and air-conditioning, the building was designed with large windows, and partition walls that did not reach the ceiling. This encouraged air circulation throughout the building, but was useful for the residents too.

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"We didn't have much in the way of privacy. No locks on doors. The Home Matron would do rounds at night with a torch to see if you were in bed. Walls only charth bit was the back walls. about halfway up to the ceiling. Sometimes sparrows would fly through the windows and above the walls."

"The Lady Lamington Building had these floor to ceiling windows. We rarely closed them completely. Sometimes at night you could hear windows being raised – frightening the first time, but then you got used to the noise of girls sneaking in after curfew and trying to evade the Matron I With no door locks, you could easily get to your room through someone else's."


