Recognising potential acute respiratory infection outbreaks Quick reference guide

Early recognition of acute respiratory infection (ARI) ensures a rapid and effective outbreak response.

ARI definition

Recent onset of new or worsening acute respiratory symptoms:

 cough, breathing difficulty, sore throat, or runny nose/nasal congestion, with or without other symptoms

Other symptoms include:

- headaches, muscle aches, fatigue, loss of appetite, nausea or vomiting and diarrhoea
- Loss of smell and taste can also occur with COVID-19
- fever (≥37.5°C) may occur in elderly individuals
- new onset or increase in confusion, change in baseline behaviour, falling, or exacerbation of underlying chronic illness (e.g. shortness of breath in someone with congestive heart failure)

ARI outbreak definition

- 2 or more residents test positive for influenza, COVID-19 or RSV within a 72-hour period
- 2 or more epidemiologically linked ARIs in residents within a 72-hour period (where influenza, COVID-19 and RSV have been excluded)

Preparing for early recognition of ARI outbreaks

- Ensure staff know the clinical criteria to recognise ARI
- Commence heightened ARI surveillance for residents and staff Apr-Oct
- · Implement a process for staff to monitor and report ARI
- Identify staff to assess reported ARI cases for potential outbreaks (daily)

Actions when an outbreak definition is met

- Isolate resident cases and exclude staff cases from the facility
- · Activate your facility's ARI outbreak management plan
